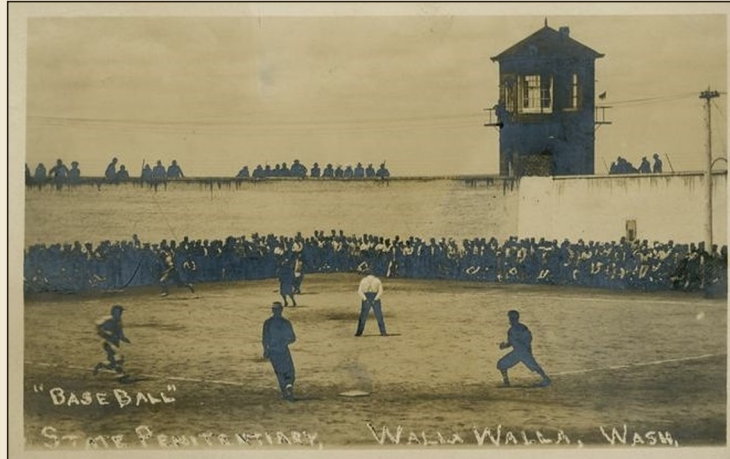

THE LOGLINE

Inside Washington's oldest maximum-security penitentiary, a ragtag team of convicts built a baseball dynasty that drew paying crowds to bleachers raised above the prison walls — a forty-year experiment in redemption that the archives remember and the bookshelves have forgotten.

THE UNTOLD HISTORY

From their first recorded game in **1907** through their heyday in the **1940s**, the WSP Mavericks played semipro and barnstorming clubs from across the Pacific Northwest — all from inside the walls of a penitentiary that had stood since **1886**. Drawing on team photos made from real prison mugshots, original game programs, the prison's own newspaper, and never-published letters, *Ball 'n' Chains* reconstructs the era through the men who lived it: the lifers, the ringers, the wardens who bet on them, and the townspeople who paid to watch.
